WELCOME

(from Director, Carol Bense)

"Would you direct Gypsy in the Fall?" he said. "I'll help," he said. "OK," I said. And away we went for the whirlwind that is Gypsy. I knew we would not have a chorus, but I was not prepared for the 35 people that we did need for the show. Usually we have about 15 or so in the chorus plus the leads – Not Gypsy. So many of the cast have tiny parts, and we are so grateful to each of them for filling those roles that absolutely must be filled to tell this story. They don't get to sing, they don't get to dance, and they are not even on stage for very long; but each one came to rehearsals and created the character needed.

And, of course, all these people need costumes, many of them need two or three costumes and some need four or five. "Oh, yeah!" I would say to the costumer. "We need a rich kid costume and a boy scout costume and four or five gowns for Gypsy, and matching coats, and two costumes for the newsboys and two for the Hollywood Blondes." "OK," she would say, with a weary look in her eye. And they were dressed.

"And by the way," I said to him as he designed the set. "Don't forget we need a car, a train, a haystack, and a kiosk." He knew that, but was trying to forget it. And they appeared.

"Can you choreograph the reprise to "Together" in addition to all the other numbers you have choreographed?" I asked the choreographer. "Oh sure," she said, after drilling the little kids for an hour or so on their number. "Can we work on my number on Tuesday (not one of our scheduled rehearsal days)?" asked one of the leads. "Oh, sure," she said. And she taught and they danced.

The Music Director started coming to rehearsals an hour or two early so he could fit in work with all the people who do sing and dance in the show. "5:30 to 6:30 I'll work with Louise," he said, "then "6:30 to 7:00" with the little newsboys and Baby June and Baby Louise, then "7:00 to 7:15" with Herbie, and so on." "OK," I said. And they all came and they all sang and they all danced and they all worked so hard.

And now we have a great show. It took all the people listed in the Cast and Crew to make it happen. It's all for you. We hope you enjoy it.
