

#### **Cast Bios**

One of his favorite roles here was Sgt. Toomey in Biloxi Blues, and who can forget God in Spamalot? More recent shows include Laughing Stock and Farce of Nature. Yeah, he couldn't keep his pants on but that's OK... The friends he's made and the talent he's encountered at The Village Players are enough to humble anyone... even Bob. "My love to all my friends and family here. All the world's a stage..."
